

#### Medicated To Survive Columbine Shooting: To Heal, You Must Feel

On May 18, 37 year old Austin Eubanks, a 1999 Columbine High School shooting survivor, was found dead. An autopsy is expected to be performed this week.

Mr. Eubanks was 17 year olds when he was shot in the hand and knee on what seemed to be an otherwise ordinary school day. Twelve students and one teacher were killed in what was known at that time as the deadliest school shooting.

Prescribed pain medication helped the 17 year old deal with the pain of the visible wounds and allowed him to escape the emotions of the event that killed his best friend. Years later, in an attempt to heal himself and help others, Mr. Eubanks publicly shared that he became addicted to Oxycontin, Adderall, illicit drugs, and alcohol. The emotional pain he didn't face at 17 was finally faced at age 29 and his story became one of healing and hope.

# Mental Health Month: Good Mental Health Is Essential To Overall Well-Being

According to the Office on Women's Health at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, good mental health is essential to overall well-being. More than 1 in 5 women in the U.S. experienced a mental health condition in the past year, such as depression or anxiety.

Many mental health conditions, such as depression and bipolar disorder, affect more women than men or affect women in different ways from men. Many serious mental health conditions cannot be cured, but they can be treated. Getting better and living well is possible.

# **2019 Howard County Overdoses**

On May 13, the Howard County Police reported 71 known overdoses (9\* fatal and 62 nonfatal) in 2019.

\*In fatal cases, some deaths are pending autopsy results for opioids and/or other substances. Numbers may fluctuate. If you or someone you know in Howard County needs help with an opioid or other drug issue, call 410-531-6677, 24-hours a day, or go

to Grassroots Crisis Intervention Center for screening & referral assistance. Grassroots is located at 6700 Freetown Road in Columbia.

Naloxone (also known by brandname Narcan) is a life-saving medication that can be used to help restore breathing to someone who has overdosed on opioids, including heroin, prescription pain medication, and fentanyl.
