Follow Up to "A Local Sister Lost to Heroin"

At age 21, Taylor Sprague died of a heroin overdose on December 31, 2015. Recently, her mother and sister shared their feelings about receiving the tragic news and how it has affected them since that day.

In the video, they describe how Taylor's death changed the way they look at things, that it affected their health and relationships, and that the police announcement that she died of a heroin overdose had to be *wrong*. They never dreamed their college honor student and former General Assembly Page could have been using drugs.

Kylie & Kerri Sprague express that they wish they had known the signs, known that nodding off and breaking out were not just symptoms of an overworked student. They also warn that death from a drug overdose can affect anyone and that it does not pick and choose its victims.

Check Out the "Drunk Suit" Experiment

On March 2, NBC Today demonstrated the use of a scientifically engineered "drunk suit" which simulates alcohol's effects on the body. Part of a program called Ford Driving Skills for Life, the suit is being tried on teenagers in the hope that they will be "scared straight" in order to prevent drunk driving accidents.

The suit includes "beer googles" to impair vision and weights on knees and arms. The experiment involves a simulated traffic stop and driving an obstacle course. The results were dramatic.

Need Treatment? Get Help Now!

Are you seeking information on facilities in Maryland that offer substance misuse and/or mental health treatment?

Do You Take An Opioid (Prescription Pain Medication)?

Common Opioids prescribed for pain (i.e., dental surgery, sports injuries, routine surgeries, etc.): Percocet, Morphine, Dilaudid, Fentanyl, Oxycodone, Vicodin, etc.

KNOW 7 Signs of an Opioid Overdose

- 1. Breathing: slow, shallow, or stopped
- 2. Blue lips and fingertips
- 3. Gray, clammy skin and vomiting
- 4. Loud snoring or gurgling noises ("death rattle")
- 5. Person unresponsive
- 6. Slow pulse/No pulse
- 7. Awake, but unable to talk Administer Naloxone and CALL 911 FOR HELP!

KNOW the Danger of Fentanyl

- -Toxic in small amounts & can kill in minutes.
- -Mixed with & sold as heroin, cocaine & other drugs or pressed into fake Rx pills
- -Unable to be detected by look, smell or taste
- -A fentanyl OD can be reversed with naloxone
- -You, your family and your friends can carry naloxone For more information, visit MDDestinationRecovery.org
