Family Spent More Than \$110,000 For Drug Treatment And Son Still Died

For years, HC DrugFree has been sharing stories about families from across Howard County and the U.S. spending hundreds of thousands of dollars on drug/alcohol treatment. In some of these cases, these sons and daughters just couldn't overcome their addiction or substance disorder.

In one such case, pleading for God's help to fight his addiction, a young man wrote, "I don't need a God that will open the gates of heaven and let me in, I just want the gates of hell to to open up and let me out."


Clean Your Medicine Cabinet To Keep Your Family Safe And Tell Your Friends!
