Foo Fighters Drummer Dies

According to the Office of the Attorney General of Colombia, a preliminary toxicology reported showed that Taylor Hawkins, Foo Fighters talented musician and drummer, had several substances in his system at the time of his death. Opioids, benzodiazepines, tricyclic antidepressants and THC, the psychoactive compound in marijuana were on the list. Read NBC News update.

12-Year-Old Dies from Fentanyl

Detectives in New Jersey were notified that a 12-year-old boy was found unresponsive on his school bus. Life-saving measures were performed by the school nurse until emergency medical services arrived and transported the child to the hospital. Officers and school staff took immediate actions to ensure that no other children or staff were in any danger. The child's postmortem exam was conducted by the City of Philadelphia Office of the Medical Examiner's Office, which determined the cause of death was Drug Intoxication, specifically fentanyl.

It is alleged that the boy's uncle manufactured fentanyl and forced the boy to clean up drug paraphernalia containing fentanyl. The uncle was charged with first degree Aggravated Manslaughter, first degree Strict Liability Drug-Induced Death, first degree Maintaining a Controlled Dangerous Substances (CDS) Production Facility, second degree Employing a Juvenile in a Drug Distribution Scheme, six counts of third degree Endangering the Welfare of a Child, and several other charges. Parents, do you know the steps to protect yourself or your child online?


A 17-year-old Michigan student died by suicide last week after being a victim of sextortion. He was being threatened to pay money or pictures he had taken of himself would be sent to family and Instagram followers.

Protect yourself or your child online with these tips from the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). Contact the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center (IC3). In 2021, the IC3 received over 18,000 sextortion-related complaints.

Law Enforcement Seizures of Pills Containing Fentanyl

Law enforcement seizures of pills containing illicit fentanyl increased dramatically between January 2018 and December 2021, according to a new study funded by the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA). The number of individual pills seized by law enforcement increased nearly 50-fold from the first guarter of 2018 to the last guarter of 2021, and the proportion of pills to total seizures more than doubled, with pills representing over a quarter of illicit fentanyl seizures by the end of 2021. The study also found an increase in the number of fentanyl-containing powder seizures during this time. Click here to read more or click on the graphic below for a printable copy.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has taken steps to foster the development of non-addictive alternative for acute pain management. Even at prescribed doses for acute pain management, opioid analgesics pose a risk for addiction, overdose, and misuse. Having non-opioid analgesic alternatives could have a significant impact on public health and safety. To further address the opioid crisis, the FDA has issued draft guidance to provide recommendations to companies developing non-opioid analgesics for acute pain lasting up to 30 days, typically in response to some form of tissue injury, such as trauma or surgery. Parent CRAFT is a free, online video series to teach parents the skills they need to meet the risks of substance abuse. Parent CRAFT will benefit any parent with an adolescent or adult child that is at any stage of using drugs or alcohol.

Parents who just suspect their child may be experimenting, as well as those who know that their child is using substances, will find these skills very useful in heading off more serious issues. The earlier you can intervene the better. With the easily available and commonly used drugs by our children, often experimenting can lead to dangerous behaviors, permanent health damage, and even death
