




Sometimes You Need A Dose of Vitamin Sea

HoCo Student Focus Group on Smoking & Vaping

In our recent Life Skills class, HC DrugFree's team had the opportunity to go straight to the source and ask Howard County middle and high school students what they think about smoking & vaping. During one discussion, it became apparent that some kids didn't consider vaping to be "smoking", so we did a poll. Here are the results:

When you hear the term "smoking" what initially comes to your mind



In the image above, you can see that the students we polled primarily considered the term "smoking" to be referencing smoking cigarettes <u>only</u>. Approximately half as many felt smoking referred to both smoking cigarettes and vaping. Why does this matter?

During the last several years, we have heard from Howard County youth who believe that vaping doesn't count as smoking, even believing that vaping devices don't contain nicotine! We feel it is urgent for young people to understand that vaping is just another form a smoking. Despite being considered more socially acceptable today than traditional cigarettes, there are risks involved and questions that won't be answered until we're able to evaluate the long-term consequences of vaping. What to ask your doctor before taking opioids:

- Why do I need this medication?
- How long should I take this medication?
- Are there non-opioid alternatives?




- What if I have a history of addiction?
- What if there is a history of addiction in my family?
- Could this treatment interact with my other medication?
- How should I store my opioid medication?
- What should I do with unused opioid medicine?
- Should I carry Naloxone?



Studies show that three out of four people using heroin began with the use of prescription medication. Taken as prescribed, opioids may help manage pain when taken for a short amount of time. However, prolonged use often leads to physical dependence and the risk of addiction occurs. Learn more

Medication Storage/Disposal

How Improper Disposal of Medicines May End Up in Our Drinking Water Sources



In homes that use septic tanks, prescription and over-the-counter drugs flushed down the toilet can leach into the ground and seep into ground water. In cities and towns where residences are connected to wastewater treatment plants, prescription and over-the-counter drugs poured down the sink or flushed down the toilet can pass through the treatment system and enter rivers and lakes. They may flow downstream to serve as sources for community drinking water supplies. Water treatment plants are generally not equipped to routinely remove medicines.


